All entries should be made with the proper authorities by the time or date stated in this supplement. Livestock entries are due as stated in their respective areas in this supplement. All other open class entries close Tuesday at 8 p.m. of Fair Week.

Superintendents reserve the right to reject any entries. The same exhibit cannot compete for more than one premium. In case of no competition, first money will be awarded, only if the exhibit is of such quality to merit the first place award.

Premiums will be forwarded to exhibitors in a timely manner, (some will be available at closing of the fair). All premiums not called for before October 31 will be forfeited to the association. All entries will be released at noon Sunday. The Saline County Ag. Society is not responsible for any entries not claimed by 2 p.m.

LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS

All application for entries, stalls and pens (where applicable) are required to be made by **July 5** when entries close.

Open class shows will immediately follow the Junior Livestock Show of each specie.

All animals must be owned by the exhibitor for at least 30 days prior to the opening of the fair. All livestock must be owned by the exhibitor making the entry and must be shown by that exhibitor except in case of injury, sickness or other acceptable reason.

All livestock exhibitors must clean out their stalls/pens and move the bedding to a specified dump area, or premium money may be withheld.

All livestock classes offered in the Junior Show will be offered in the Open Division along with additional classes listed in that area. When filling out entry cards use the Department and Section Number assigned here and the Class Number as found in this section or in the 4-H section. Exhibitor number will be assigned. All rules pertaining to the Junior Show also should be followed in this show except for the dress code, however, to best represent you and your livestock, please dress appropriately.

No entries can compete in both the Junior and Open Class Divisions the same year.

Premiums will be the same as in the Junior Show (where applicable).

GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

A1. EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY:

Open Class exhibits* may be from any Nebraska resident (see age limits on livestock entries below), with entry limits as outlined in junior rules unless specified differently. Special awards referring to Best of Saline County will be limited to entries from Saline County residents.

*Cloverbud 4-H members may show in open class livestock classes only if enrolled in 4-H, identification was completed on age appropriate animals by June 15, and entered for the fair by the early entry date. All other open class livestock exhibitors must be 8 and older to participate in the show arena.

4-H age guidelines permitting youth 5-7 years old to show animals less than 6 months of age and under an approximate weight of 350 pounds will be followed. Safety concerns are sighted for not showing animals beyond these guidelines. (Most feeder calves, all breeding heifers and market beef and horses will not fit in these ranges.)

Exhibitors are encouraged to show animals that they can control without endangering themselves other exhibitors and spectators.

Exhibitors and/or animals that are not in control will be excused from the arena after the second escape, for the safety of all those in attendance.

A2. PROPER SHOW ATTIRE

Proper show attire is up to the discretion of the exhibitor. Clean, well fitting, appropriate clothing will give the best impression to those observing the show.

A3. RIBBON POLICY

Exhibits will be divided into groups according to merit. Blue will denote 1st place (Superior) exhibits, red will denote 2nd (excellent) exhibits, white will denote 3rd (good) exhibit and pink will denote a 4th (acceptable) exhibit.

Awards will be made on merit. Awards will not be awarded to animals deemed not worthy for an award by the judge. Premium money will

be paid only where indicated.

A4. OWNERSHIP OF ANIMALS AND POULTRY

All animals to be shown must be owned by the exhibitor or family.

A5. SUBSTITUTE SHOWMEN:

An exhibitor who has more than one animal in a class need not secure approval for another exhibitor. They do need to be sure and let the show clerk know so results can be accurately recorded.

A6. ANIMAL HEALTH

Animals that have active ringworm, or visible warts, will not be allowed entry into the county fair for exhibition. Ringworm will be judged to be inactive if the ringworm lesion area is not encrusted and hair has begun re-growth in the area.

Animals with warts that are not visible by a hands off inspection will be allowed to remain on the premises and can be exhibited.

A7. ENTRIES

All entries are due on or before July 6 to the Saline County Extension Office. Forms may be requested from the Extension Office at 821-2151.

Classes offered at the Saline County Fair are not necessarily offered at other shows, they have been added at this show only to enhance the learning opportunities.

A8. STALLS, PENS & BEDDING

Stalls and pens will be assigned by the Superintendent and posted in their respective barns.

Bedding for beef, sheep, and swine is the responsibility of the exhibitor. Refer to each area for specific bedding details.

Switching or trading pens: The superintendent must be notified of any change in pen assignments.

Please identify your livestock with stall cards or a sign.

A9. ANIMAL ELIGIBILITY

All exhibitors are limited to the same numbers of livestock as the junior show. No animals may be shown in both the open and junior show.

A10. FITTING AND SHOWING ANIMALS

Grooming animals for show is primarily the responsibility of exhibitors. However, assistance from family members, and fellow exhibitors is permitted as a learning tool for future shows.

In the beef show, blow and show is the rule, no other substances of any kind should be used in show day preparation. False tails will be allowed, but no twining, air or other methods of altering the body shape is allowed. Bucket calves can only be washed and have their hair combed in its natural direction.

In the swine show, pigs must be shown without hairdressing compounds. This includes oils, powder or any other coat dressing compounds. Water is permitted.

Sheep (unless a wool breed) are to have been sheared within 14 days of the fair date.

Upon violation of above rules, the exhibitors animal will be dropped one ribbon group in the live show.

A11. EXHIBITOR ETHICS STATEMENT

The following has been agreed upon by the Saline County Agricultural Society and deemed policy for the Saline County Fair.

1. The right to interpret rules in the best interest of fairness is reserved for the Superintendent, whose decision will be final.
2. Any exhibitor who inhumanely abuses an animal or alters an animal's appearance through unnatural actions or procedures will forfeit any premium, ribbon or prize won, during the fair at which the abuse(s) or alteration(s) took place.
3. The Saline County Agricultural Society Board has agreed that abuse or alteration of appearance will be defined as the following actions which have occurred or were attempted on/to an animal present at the Saline County Fair. Defined by species:

Sheep--

X Beating, slapping, using an electric prod or physically forcing a lamb into a solid object in an attempt to make the animal brace more firmly.

X The use of cold water, wraps or ice in or on the body of an animal in an attempt to make the animal brace more firmly.

Swine--

X The use of hairdressing compounds such as oils, powder, or any other coat dressing compound on an animal in order to enhance its appearance.

Beef/Dairy--

X Changing the major color pattern of an animal by painting or dyeing of the animal.

X False hair other than tails through twining.

The following definitions of abuse and/or alteration apply to all livestock shown at the Saline County Fair--

X Forced consumption of water in an attempt to increase the weight of an animal.

- X The use of unnatural means, such as drugs, to reduce the weight of an animal.
 - X The use of a compound(s) or drug(s) on a species other than the species it was approved for by the FDA.
 - X The use of a drug or compound outside the specified withdrawal requirements of the FDA.
 - X The use of air or any other artificial method of altering the body shape of an animal.
 - X Any action the superintendent feels is inappropriate or abusing treatment of an animal.
4. In cases that are not specifically addressed in this statement one warning will be issued by the Superintendent before action is taken in accordance to the policy stated above in section 2.
5. Any animal entered in the Saline County Fair is subject to both urine and blood testing at the discretion of the superintendent. If blood and/or urine testing is requested, the cost of the test(s) will be incurred by the exhibitor of the animal, if the results of the test(s) indicate a Saline County Fair Drug Use rule has been violated. If the results indicate that no Saline County Drug Use Rule has been violated, the cost of the test(s) will be incurred by the Saline County Fair.

Section 1 - SWINE

Show time immediately following the Junior show.

This is a non-terminal show. Hogs will be sold to the highest bidder. Exhibitors must have a Quality Assurance Certificate to exhibit at the Saline County Fair. Exhibitors are highly encouraged to weigh swine prior to entry to avoid light weight entries and subsequent pricing penalties.

Medicating an animal should be cleared with the superintendent(s) or may be grounds for immediate dismissal from the fair.

Swine are encouraged to be between 230 and 300 pounds live weight, hogs lighter or heavier than these limits may receive a discounted price because of the weight. Must be designated by 6 p.m. Friday for slaughter or release to the farm. NO late changes. Not signed up will go to slaughter. Non-terminal will be released at 4 p.m. on Sunday.

Entry day will be on Wednesday, 4:00 to 8:00 p.m. If animals absolutely cannot be brought on Wednesday evening, contact the superintendent to arrange an alternative time.

Weigh in will be on Thursday morning following the Junior Show check in which starts at 8 a.m. unless otherwise noted. There are no re-weighs.

Rules from the Junior portion of this book may be referred to for further information.

Woodchips or sawdust only are to be used.

The open show will start after the Junior portion of the show is completed.

All market hogs will be shown by weight classes determined by the weight at the Thursday weigh in.

Section 3 - BEEF

Show time, immediately following the Junior Show.

Calves must be broke to lead in order to show and compete for awards.

No beef can be shown in both the Open and Junior shows. No beef animal can be shown in both a market and breeding class. No calf can be shown in both a feeder calf and breeding heifer class

CLASS NUMBER is extremely important if you want to be in the right class the day of the show.

Animals may be brought to the fair grounds on Wednesday 4-8 p.m. or Thursday before 8:30 a.m.

Check in will be Thursday morning starting at 9:00 a.m.

Tie stalls may be used outside of barns from 9 p.m. to 8 a.m. Barn and tie stalls will be assigned to exhibitors.

Straw or wood chips are to be used for bedding. Stalls should be cleaned out upon conclusion of the fair, and premiums will be withheld if not.

In order to comply with the Nebraska Poultry Disease Act, poultry exhibited may be tested as part of the Bureau of Animal Industry's monitoring for the presence of pullorum and typhoid in Nebraska.

No stock can be removed from the show before the close of the fair except if it shows signs of disease, in which case it will be promptly removed from the poultry department. The superintendent has full authority in determination of sick birds.

Judging will be Friday. No animals may be entered in both Open and Junior Divisions.

A limit of 8 entries per exhibitor. The Poultry Superintendent reserves the right to accept, reject, and/or limit, or "bring show day only" any entry(s) depending upon space.
